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CHAIRMAN'S REPORT



As spring approaches lot been has happenina for the Friends since the beginning of the year and a lot has been planned for the months ahead. The first of our sponsored aames at Eastbourne

Borough took place on February 4th. The junior team did a bucket collection around the ground wearing their kit with the Friends logo on it. About £200 was raised despite Borough losing! There was plenty of advertising of the Friends both around the pitch and over the loudspeaker system, and 5 members of the DGH team took penalties against a Borough keeper at half time. A great day for all.

And on March 15th we held another Dine around the World at the Dem Shish restaurant. Not only was it the biggest attendance ever at 130 but it also raised £1600, a record for Dine around the World. The next meal is at Spice Garden on 21st June so book early to avoid disappointment.

MAJOR PROJECT 2022: TARGET MET

To raise half a million pounds for a replacement surgical robot was an ambitious project for 2022, especially with fundraising events and attendance still recovering from the pandemic, but the members of the Friends and the incredibly supportive community around us rose to the challenge and joined us in a year of phenomenal fundraising and very generous donations.

On the occasion of the Friends AGM in November last year, Chairman Harry Walmsley was able to announce that the target had been reached. He said, "It was a pleasure to make the replacement Urology Robot the Friends of Eastbourne Hospital's major project for 2022 and help keep Eastbourne Urology a regional centre of excellence and at the forefront of Urology Cancer services. The £500K was raised fundraising, legacies, through and donations, including generous ones from the Sussex Masonic Charity and the Medi Tech Trust. We are as always extremely grateful to the people of Eastbourne for their continued generosity in helping the Friends support our hospital in Eastbourne".

In 2023 we were able to visit the robot in situ, and meet the Urology team who expressed the following, "We are so grateful to the Friends of Eastbourne Hospital for raising the funds to enable us to replace our old faithful robot, with a brand new, state-of-the-art model. This will enable us to continue giving patients robotic surgery for removal of cancerous kidneys, bladders and prostates, as well as some important operations for benign conditions. Using the robot for surgery smaller incisions. preservation of functional nerves which historically were sacrificed in an open operation, and overall a quicker recovery time for patients to return to normal."

On behalf of the Friends and of Urology, whatever part you played in helping us reach this vital target, we thank you from the bottom of our hearts.



TRUST FOCUS: THE AFTER TRAUMA TEAM

Trauma patients are those that have suffered and survived some of the most severe, life-changing injuries that the NHS treats, requiring serious and often complex surgery to save their lives.

Kirsti Bennett-Koster, Clinical Lead Physiotherapist in our after trauma team, talks about her team's work in helping these patients return to their lives following their injuries.

"These patients have many complex needs. An individual patient may have suffered a brain injury, a spinal injury, have needed abdominal surgery or have needed treatment for broken or even missing limbs. The after trauma team works with our ward teams to coordinate and deliver the wide range of complex care that these patients need to be able to return to their lives."

The complicated nature of these patients' needs is reflected in the scope of the expertise of the team, made up of rehabilitation consultant therapists. specialist acauired brain iniury occupational therapists, specialist orthopaedic physiotherapists, specialist neurological physiotherapists, orthopaedic specialist nurse practitioners as well as the essential rehabilitation. trauma, audit and research network and trauma nurse service coordinators who help manage the extensive, interlinked treatment pathways. The extreme nature of trauma patients' injuries can have a serious psychological impact, so the team also works with clinical psychologists attached to the critical care unit.

Many of the patients the team see have had their initial urgent treatment at the Major Trauma Centre for the region, based at Brighton's Royal Sussex Hospital. "We speak to the Major Trauma Centre every week to make sure we are working closely with them, as well as a few days before a patient is transferred back to us," says Kirsti. "It means that we can make sure that the patient can be admitted smoothly, even when we are busy. That's really important because of the level of care and support that they need."

As well as these transfers, the team also looks after other patients who need complex, trauma-related care.

"We can support any patients with complex, trauma-related needs. We take patients from wards and from the surgical assessment unit, as well as intensive care, high dependency and critical care units."

Patients who have suffered trauma often have difficult prognoses. The care provided by the after trauma team can address the range of needs patients may have and provide a road map to recovery — even if their injuries are life-changing.

"Our aim is to get patients up, get them going and get them home, but that isn't always straightforward. It's about helping these patients achieve the best outcome possible for their situation. Many can go back to their lives with comparatively few changes, but that's often not the case."

The unique role of the after trauma team means that they are able to see patients who wouldn't be suitable for other teams.

"Patients who have suffered brain injuries often aren't fully aware of their situation and may not be able to engage with conventional rehabilitation and therapy," says Kirsti. "Our team can support these patients, as well as those with other significant impairments — up to and including comatose patients."

THE FRIENDS DONATE TO OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY







At the end of 2022, the Occupational Therapy Department approached the Friends with a bid for £4,500, to buy numerous pieces of equipment that would improve their new assessment kitchen.

Following repeated flooding and a reconfiguration of space, the OT treatment area had been turned into a dual-purpose room suitable both for kitchen assessments and a range of OT assessments including cognitive assessments, upper and lower limb therapy.

However, the equipment available to the team had not been updated for over 20 years and the OT department felt they were at a point where they were unable to effectively assess their patients' needs nor support their decision-making. They therefore submitted their bid to the Friends, with a shopping list of scores of specially-adapted, day-to-day items, which they felt would make a real different to patients' independence, dignity and potentially even length of stay as they were encouraged to re-engage with the normal activities of daily living.

Rosy Shrubbs, Clinical Lead Occupational Therapist explained that, "Enabling patients to participate in normal activity can help motivate towards an earlier discharge, reduce carer burden and improve quality of life. For some individuals these devices can also significantly reduce risk and pain, with items adapted for visual impairment. The use of colour can enable individuals on their dementia journey, and adapted seating benefits the arthritic and fatigued."

Named the 'Friends Kitchen', not only to reflect the support of the Friends of Eastbourne Hospital, but also to give the space a nice ring to it when bringing patients down, the new kitchen is indeed a very calming space.

Specialist Occupational Therapist Fraser Walsh-Beney told us he felt it was a place where patients could now really "decompress". During patient's one assessment, the decision was made to bake some scones, and with all the equipment now available to the team, this was done successfully. The patient proudly returned to the ward with his baking and has since been back to do more. Fraser explained that the kitchen is so versatile now that some patients don't even really realise they are having a cognitive assessment. He said it is also a place which "just makes difficult conversations easier".

Furthermore, Fraser believes the new facility is a real asset for the Trust itself, and should serve as a selling point for other therapists to come to the DGH. It demonstrates a commitment to reablement and hope for the future, which is at the heart of every Occupational Therapist's role.

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THE FRIENDS DONATE TO STAFF RESTAURANT REFURBISHMENT

Alongside the gratitude we received from Occupational Therapy for contributions to the 'Friends Kitchen'. we were also delighted to have our £10.000 donation to the Restaurant acknowledged with an invitation to see the refurbished area, meet the team whose vision it was, and enjoy a cream tea reception prepared by the manager of Catering Operations, Andrew Park. We spent a lovely couple of hours doing all three!

The successful bid, submitted by the Building for our Future team in 2022, was for the Workspace Project, requesting funding for furniture to improve and enhance both the Staff Restaurant and Coffee Shop areas.

The project was completed at the beginning of the year and the restaurant now features a mixture of modern, vibrant furniture in an open and spacious environment; achieving the aim of providing flexible space for staff breaks and lunch, but also facilitating informal conversations outside of the lunchtime period. The coffee shop area has been designed with a similar, modern theme, in fresh greens and greys, and is permanently open for staff to use on their breaks.

Joe Chadwick-Bell, Chief Executive of ESHT, attended the event and spoke very highly of not only the area and the Friends' donation, but of the team who had made it happen. She explained that the previous, tired furniture had been there for some 30 years and looked dated and uninspiring. The Building for our Future Team's hard work and vision meant that the space was now a fresh, new environment which would provide necessary time out for colleagues. She also thanked the Friends not only for their contribution to the restaurant but for all the fundraising they do on behalf of the DGH.

We received some wonderful feedback from the staff themselves when we posted this news on social media too. One staff member wrote "It looks amazing in our restaurant, thank you" while another posted "It's so much nicer and brighter in there now, thank you." A Trustee herself, as well as a current member of clinical staff. Trish Hamblin sent a message to all Trustees and supporters of the Friends to say that she wanted everyone to know the restaurant transformation had had a massive impact on staff morale, and that staff now look forward to visiting their restaurant. She thanked everyone very much.







CHANGES TO CARDIOLOGY SERVICES

The proposed improvements to cardiology services within the Trust were approved at the end of last year and the work has now begun to implement them.

Here's what it means for your hospital; how and why some services will be concentrated at the DGH; and, on the facing page, how the Friends will be supporting the expanding cardiology department in Eastbourne with their major fundraising project for 2023.

The following information is taken from news published by East Sussex Healthcare NHS Trust:

The East Sussex Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee (HOSC) has endorsed proposals to improve cardiology services for the people of East Sussex.

The proposals, which aim to improve the quality of care for all those who need it, cut waiting times, reduce how long people have to stay in hospital, and the number of times they need to visit for appointments or tests, were developed by hospital doctors, GPs and other health professionals.

The vast majority (97%) of cardiology services will stay the same at both the Conquest and the DGH. To make sure that the majority of patients receive good quality care close to home outpatients, non-invasive diagnostics, cardiac-monitored beds, cardiac rehabilitation and heart failure services will stay at both hospitals and in the community (where these services are already provided).

Cardiology care at both the Conquest Hospital and Eastbourne DGH will be enhanced by creating new cardiac response teams to attend at the front end of the hospitals. This will ensure that people are assessed quicker, when they first come into the emergency departments of the hospitals, meaning that emergency patients start receiving specialist care more quickly.

However, following consideration of all the evidence, it was recommended that highly specialist cardiac services be sited at Eastbourne DGH.

Concentrating the most highly specialised interventional and specialist inpatient cardiology services on one site meets national best practice and will mean the highest standard of care for patients. This will also allow staff to develop greater expertise in new treatments.

Although neither hospital was specified as the preferred site to base these services (as both sites are fully able to deliver the new model of care safely. with the right staff and to the highest and standards). independently-facilitated site panel meeting was held on 12 September as part of the wider engagement and public consultation process. The criteria (listed on the opposite page) weighting used at the meeting was informed bv feedback from consultations and other evidence.

These plans are the culmination of a comprehensive programme of work that has considered the best clinical evidence, recommendations from clinical experts and a review and evaluation of feedback from two separate public consultations in which hundreds of people, including service users, carers and their families, as well as a wide range of organisations, took part.

The criteria considered at the independently-facilitated site panel meeting included:

- Population demographics
- Health needs
- · Health inequalities
- Travel times
- Accessibility of services
- Conveyances and inter-hospital transfers
- Differences of infrastructure on each site
- Patient, public and cardiology service staff views
- Activity by point of delivery and site, including the number of patients impacted
- Implementation and operational issues
- Finance
- Best use of resources

Professor Nik Patel, Senior Cardiologist and Cardiovascular lead at East Sussex Healthcare NHS Trust, said:

"We will now be able to provide timely cardiac expertise to all our East Sussex patients. We will see the benefits of a faster and more responsive cardiac service with new state of the art facilities"

Dinesh Sinha, Chief Medical Officer, NHS Sussex, said:

"I would like to thank everyone who has got us to this point, in particular our dedicated clinical teams and our engaged local communities, who use our services and helped us shape our plans. The improvements we can now start to make mean that patients will see many benefits in terms of the quality of care they receive and their experience when using services."



2023 Major Project

At the AGM for the Friends of Eastbourne Hospital, held in 2022. November Chairman Harry Walmsley announced that the 2023 Major Project for the Friends would be to raise £250k to buy specialist equipment for the cardiac catheter lab at the Following DGH recent discussions with the Trustees of the Friends of Eastbourne Hospital, and the Cardiology Department of the DGH, this target has been raised to £400k and the required equipment confirmed to be state-of-the-art robotics and cardiac coronary imaging equipment.

Volunteering Opportunities

All the below roles are carried out at Eastbourne DGH

The Main Shop

An often-essential service for patients, visitors and staff, the Main Shop sells a wide variety of items. It is headed by a shop manager and is run by a dedicated team of volunteers. No previous experience of shop work is required to volunteer in the shop as on the job training is provided.

The Radiotherapy Cafe

The Radiotherapy Centre provides treatment for patients from across East Sussex. People receiving a cancer diagnosis, plus their friends and family, may need information and support or simply somewhere to wait. Volunteers here provide a quiet coffee and snack shop, but also help healthcare professionals signpost anyone seeking support to the info they need.

The Corner Shop (also known as Staff Shop)

This shop is situated at the back of the hospital, and its customers are predominately members of staff. It can consequently be a quieter shift than in the Main Shop. It sells a similar array of goods as the main shop but on a smaller scale. It's run by volunteers under the supervision of the Main Shop Manager.

The Trolley Service

Invaluable for staff and patients who can't leave the wards, a Sandwich Trolley goes out twice a day providing food, drinks and papers. Each trolley is manned by two volunteers, and not only are these volunteers providing a much appreciated service, they are also raising the profile of the Friends of Eastbourne Hospital in a very positive way.

The Volunteering Process

- The first thing to do is to contact Amy or Sue in the Friends Office (01323 749503 / esh-tr.friendsdgh@nhs.net). You will then be put in touch with the shop manager who will talk to you about current opportunities and arrange with Voluntary Services for you to start the recruitment process.
- You will be given an application pack to complete. This includes a DBS check, which is an easy process and can be done quite quickly. The Voluntary Services team will be happy to help you to do it.
- A taster session will then be organised in an area that interests you. You can have more than one session in more than one area. During a taster session you will be looked after by an experienced volunteer or staff member.
- You can start as soon as you like once the application is complete. You will work with experienced volunteers while completing the training. This includes learning modules organised by Voluntary Services.
- You receive your ID badge, your car parking permit, and a very warm welcome to the team!
